AWARD PRESENTATION – MAYOR LAWS

APPROVE A STREET CLOSURE FOR AGRICULTURE "AG" DAY TO BE HELD ON FEBRUARY 5, 2019 AT 12:00 P.M. TO FEBRUARY 6, 2019 AT 5:00 P.M.

MOTION: Councilmember Johnson made a motion to approve the street closure for Agriculture Days.

SECONDED: Councilmember Rowden seconded the motion.

DISCUSSION: Councilmember Johnson said this is the Agriculture Day that we lost. Roy Ard was on the Council and was huge on Agriculture Day and it is a big deal for our community. Johnson said thank you for bringing it back. Mayor Laws said he loves looking at the tractors. Councilmember Rowden said it is her understanding that we will close the street in front of the Community Center to display the vehicles. Laws asked if we were closing the whole street or half of it. Councilmember Sheats said it would only impact the two houses in front of the Community Center and it will only block Mrs. Flander's driveway. Vice Mayor Bowlby said her signature was on the petition to close the street. Councilmember Sheats said thank you for doing the Agriculture Day, his kids enjoy it and it is a great community event.

RESOLUTION 2018-25 – A RESOLUTION APPROVING AND ADOPTING THE ELSIE S. HOGAN LIBRARY FIVE-YEAR STRATEGIC PLAN

MOTION: Councilmember Rowden made a motion to approve Resolution 2018-25 as presented.

SECONDED: Vice Mayor Bowlby seconded the motion.

DISCUSSION: Councilmember Rowden said she served on the committee as well as others and this one was run better than prior ones. They adopted everything that the committee suggested as well as a fourth goal. Rowden thanked Tom Miner for a job well done. Councilmember Garza said she was a little foggy on this. When was it decided to set up a committee and was in the budget process this last year? Finance Director Hadfield replied that it was in the budget process this last year. Rowden said it is a requirement through the State Library Association. A facilitator is hired, and community input is received through committee members. It was very realistic based on staff and how the community and library has changed. Garza asked was the committee able to establish who the main users are. Was it the County or City members? Rowden replied that statistics were presented to the committee. Councilmember Sheats asked did it state more County versus City? Library Director Tom Miner said it is about 60% County versus 40% City. Sheats asked about the age range of visitors. Miner said he did not have statistics on that. We do get a lot of kids from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. to use the library, mostly for the internet; however, a few do research projects. Garza asked how much of funding is from County and City. Miner replied that the County provides the library with about \$7,200 worth of books and we get to pick what goes on the shelf. Garza asked if it is mostly books that they are assisting us and asked if they assist in staffing? Miner replied no. Sheats asked how does that compare to other county libraries? Rowden called point of order and stated that we are approving a five-year plan. This is a City library not a County library. Rowden said she is not sure that this is what we are voting on and this may be a discussion in the future on how the library is run. Sheats asked if we can have that discussion in the future to which Johnson replied that we can during budget time. This is about strategic plan and it is either approvable or not. Vice Mayor Bowlby recommended that councilmembers talk to City Manager Blaschke or Miner regarding details. Garza asked if the library has bilingual employees. Miner replied that we recruit volunteers to speak Spanish. There are a few employees that understand Spanish but doesn't speak it well. Miner is looking forward to cultivating a relationship with Chicanos Por la Causa. Johnson said the next review of five-year plan should include Chicanos Por La Causa to have them help represent. Rowden said circulation in Spanish books has dropped so the focus on the committee is that a lot of the Spanish speakers do not read in their own language much less in English. The goal is to increase literacy of the non-English and Spanish speakers to read in their own language as well as English. Garza asked if the library would be a focal point for completing the survey for the Census. City Manager Blaschke said yes. Garza said the library might be a safety zone. Rowden then called for a vote.

DISCUSSION: Lindsey gave a background of Coronado RC&D. RC&D continued to operate even though it was separated from USDA. The City has been a participant of RC&D; however the city would not contribute funds to it anymore. Until it is closed, Sam would like to continue in the position as Treasurer. Lindsey tentatively agreed that he would accept it. Councilmember Rowden asked if this is the last year. Lindsey said it would disband in June of next year. If they have a little money left over, he will see if they can give it to the City.

FY 18-19 FIRST QUARTER FINANCIAL UPDATE – CRYSTAL HADFIELD

Finance Director/City Clerk Crystal Hadfield presented the first quarter FY18-19 finances by providing a brief overview by fund. Councilmember Rowden asked about the Public Works budget and how there was such a large increase in small equipment maintenance and did it have to do with the backhoe. Hadfield replied that no, it wasn't the backhoe and she is glad Rowden mentioned the backhoe. Our auditors said that since we acquired the backhoe last year, the expense must be moved to last year and HURF will show a higher balance once moved. Public Works Director Galo Galovale replied that the line went over due to older equipment needing repair. Councilmember Sheats said thank you, he was able to understand the reports. Hadfield said that she is feeling very positive about the year so far and everything is trending very well. City Manager Blaschke said that in January we will do a retreat for Council so that goals can be established, and we will go through a budget process.

APPROVE THE QUARTERBACK CLUB SPECIAL EVENT LICENSE APPLICATION FOR AN EVENT TO BE HELD ON DECEMBER 31ST AT THE COUNTRY SPUR LOCATED AT 115 S. HASKELL AVENUE

MOTION: Councilmember Johnson made a motion to approve the special event license application.

SECONDED: Councilmember Rowden seconded the motion.

DISCUSSION: Administrator of Development Services Jeff Stoddard said Dean Harguess couldn't make it for tonight's meeting. Councilmember Rowden asked if it is an annual party to which Vice Mayor Bowlby said yes.

ANNUAL NATURAL GAS PRESENTATION – MARIO LUNA

Jeff Stoddard presented the Natural Gas Presentation for Mario Luna. The purpose of the meeting is to protect life then property. Stoddard showed a PowerPoint presentation outlining the importance of gas safety. He discussed personnel, chain of command, and showed examples of what can happen in the event not blue staking. Stoddard discussed what to do if there is an emergency. Councilmember Rowden asked how often we replace gas meters. Stoddard said it's on a yearly rotation. Stoddard discussed the steps on what to do if you smell gas inside or outside of a building. Vice Mayor Bowlby asked what the recommended distance for an outside leak is. Stoddard said get as far away from the odor as possible. Interim Police Chief Hadfield said the rule of thumb is, if you can cover it with your thumb you are far enough away. Rowden asked how quickly the City responds to 811 requests. You must respond within 48 hours and if it is an emergency you must respond that day and it is good for two weeks. Mayor Laws asked if we are keeping up with training. Stoddard replied that yes, there are annual trainings and he goes too them now as well. Public Works Director Galo Galovale said that we now have a very qualified crew. Councilmember Johnson asked about the protocol for gas leaks. Stoddard explained the gas leak and pressure check protocols. Johnson said he received a call from an individual whose gas was turned off due to a leak and had no heat and only one valve was turned on. Stoddard said we supply electric heaters if they want them and we try to accommodate them. Rowden said she had a citizen call who was without gas and is Stoddard the only one that can inspect gas. Stoddard said Mario Luna or one of the other guys can inspect as well. Councilmember Garza said right now it is cold, but it isn't a real common problem. Stoddard said it happens quite often. Johnson said we have an old system and we need to replace the gas regulator station. Garza said we need to try to educate people. She asked if we go out to the schools or businesses to talk to employees. Stoddard said no; however, we have a liaison meeting with other communities as well. City Manager Blaschke said we send a mailer out every December. Stoddard said he also posts safety protocols online.

ANNUAL PUBLIC WORKS PRESENTATION – GALO GALOVALE

Galo Galovale gave his annual Public Works Presentation focusing on the utilities division. Galo went over assets, staff, equipment for the utilities department. Galovale discussed the regulator station process and how you can no longer order parts for it. City Manager Blaschke asked how old the regulator station is? Galovale said it was constructed before his longest working employee. Councilmember Rowden asked who supplies our gas. Finance Director Hadfield said El Paso and Munigas. Rowden asked how far out do we service? Galovale said there is a main on Airport and we go out as far as Ten Gallon Lane. Rowden asked how far out on Airport. Galovale said past Taylor to Ten Gallon about halfway down. Galovale discussed the levels of arsenic in the wells and how Linda Stoddard is trying to receive funding to buy an arsenic treatment system for our secondary well. Galovale discussed our wells and

the level drops in the last year. He feels that an aquifer study may be necessary in the future. Galovale discussed the collection and/or wastewater system as construction is coming to an end. Galovale discussed our pay rates versus Safford, Bisbee, Sierra Vista and Benson. Our rates are considerably lower. Galovale then discussed our water, wastewater, and gas rates compared to other cities. Galo then discussed recommendations for the future such as adjusting rates and investing in infrastructure and looking into pay increases for the utility workers. City Manager Blaschke discussed the focus on utilities and budget process and taking council out and looking at infrastructure. Auditors have brought it to our attention that water rates need to be raised. It costs a lot of money to run a city and maintain utilities. The regulator station is very important. Councilmember Garza asked if "W" mountain is our primary source of water. Galovale said yes and on our wells in town, the casing is still out there but they are not in use. Our water is one of the best in the County. Galovale said that ADEQ put a stop to the wells in town. Vice Mayor Bowlby said that at the State level, the aquifer and water levels are huge and maybe there is a program that we can jump on to get the study done. Councilmember Rowden said the Governor will not let the more populated municipalities have priority over the rural communities. Mayor Laws said they already stopped drilling in Elfrida. Blaschke said he spoke with North American Development Bank about a rate study to get to a balanced number and they can phase plan. Laws said when we did the treatment plant we did a study in house to raise rates for that. Blaschke said this helps with economic development as well. Chevron wants to annex into the City. Pilots and other businesses don't go into cities without city connections. Rowden asked why we are supplying gas outside of the city. Galovale said he is not sure why. Rowden said that years ago, it was cheaper to go with Southwest Gas in the County; however, it is cheaper in the City currently therefore she is seeing some leverage for the city on annexation.

DISCUSSION ON ANIMAL SHELTER – CALEB BLASCHKE

City Manager Caleb Blaschke discussed the animal shelter. He gave a brief history of the shelter and discussed the different options for the future of the shelter. Blaschke discussed the current shelter operations and gave current statistics. He gave three options for the future: build a new shelter, redistribute costs equitably between the County and City, and lastly we purchase or lease the current facility. Blaschke outlined the options and showed pictures of the proposed facility through PowerPoint if the City went that route. The County may create their own facility, therefore; we could possibly purchase or lease the current facility. Blaschke gave a history of the agreements since 2002 to current with the County. If the county were to pay their proportionate share they would owe the city \$246,784 based on the current contract for the past nine years. Blaschke wanted to bring numbers to paint the picture that the City is paying more than their proportionate share for the animals. Every two years they would take the average and recalculate at the end of the year. That was never taking place. Councilmember Rowden asked if Blaschke he believes that the county supervisors will go for opening a new county shelter to which Blaschke said he didn't know. He is sure that they are looking at most advantageous opportunity and he will have an answer back by the end of January. Rowden said the IGA, as currently was, is that we are no longer under using. Blaschke said the County is still paying us based on the old IGA amount. Rowden said it is in our best interest to continue as is. Blaschke said with the current animals we can staff it with our current ACO and a part time 10 hour a week position and we are reducing the cost. Rowden asked if they are they requiring the same stipulations as before. Blaschke said that we haven't negotiated a new IGA yet. Mayor Laws said it is his opinion that we don't take our eye off the ball. Vice Mayor Bowlby said to discuss this during the executive session. Rowden said so we are going to continue as is except with change in staffing, Blaschke replied that is correct. Councilmember Sheats asked what we do with animals that belong to the County if we operate our own shelter. Interim Public Safety Director Hadfield said that any dog that is brought to shelter, we intake. Blaschke said policy decisions in the future would determine what we do. Sierra Vista has an amazing animal shelter all funded through donations. We also work with rescues in other cities. Councilmember Garza discussed the use of volunteers for the shelters and how would that affect our liability. Finance Director Hadfield said that we pay for volunteers regardless of where they are located, and it would be added to the cost and it is minimal.

There will be a Council retreat in January to get Council's goals and go over the strategic plan. In February we will have a budget retreat and we will go over the process. There has been discussion as to whether the council should select a mayor and vice mayor secretly and now it is an open process. We will be putting that in the code as well as looking at electing a mayor at large. The SEACOM Regional Dispatch Center will save around \$200-250 thousand a year. Legislative packets show that the Governor is looking at how to do regional dispatch centers throughout the State. Councilmember Garza said that the concern is finding the dispatchers other positions within the City. Blaschke replied that is correct but it will be discussed in the future.

Councilmember Rowden said welcome to Councilmembers Akes and Sheats. She has been reflecting on the past year and she is thankful for the foresight of this council. Rowden said thank you for commitment and dedication as we've made some hard decisions this year. It is encouraging how well we work together and Rowden is hopeful that the new council will work well together. Rowden wished everyone a Merry Christmas.

Councilmember Garza said welcome to Councilmembers Akes and Sheats. Garza said it is a learning process. Garza said that the Christmas parade was fun, and the streets and park look great. Merry Christmas and prosperous New Year.

There will be tough decisions and things we don't agree on, but we will make some good decisions. 
